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

### ART & GARDEN EVENT Friday, January 18, 9:30 A.M.



AAUW Art & Garden is going to the *Asian Art Museum* on Friday, January 18, 2008, to view the *Later Chinese Jades: Ming Dynasty to Early Twentieth Century.* We'll see 73 superb examples of later Chinese jades from the museum's permanent collection. The core of this collection of approximately 1,200 pieces was donated by Avery Brundage (1887-1975). Over the past decades considerable new information has become available in this field, both from archaeological discoveries and from careful research of period texts and of objects for which the date and history is well established. Much of this new research has been undertaken by experts in China, with the Asian Art Museum bringing in a series of experts from China to survey their collection in the late 1990s.

We'll also have a docent tour titled "Jade: Beauty, Wealth, and Power," which traces jade's complex development from powerful burial talismans to treasures prized by emperors. We'll also learn about the dedication, patience, and years of training artisans must possess to produce objects of such beauty.

Cost is \$10.00 (seniors 65+ \$7.00) <u>PLUS</u> splitting the \$75.00 docent fee. Once you sign up, this is a non-refundable event as fees will be paid in advance for a maximum group of 15. We'll meet at 9:30 A.M. at either the Sycamore Park-N-Ride or the Alamo Safeway and then BART to Civic Center. We'll lunch after the tour.
